

**Contingency Plan for Countering Spills of TFM and
Bayluscide in Canada and the United States**

**Fisheries and Oceans Canada
and
U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service**

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Contingency plan overview

The following contingency plan outlines procedures undertaken to address serious accidental spills occurring during storage, transport, or application of TFM or Bayluscide. Responsible planning to prevent, minimize, and address spills of pesticides is a multiple discipline as detailed below. Safety Data Sheets (SDS) for each lampricide are appended to this plan for informational purposes. The contingency plan is available at all storage sites, in all transport vehicles, and at all lampricide application points. In addition, expert resources to address pesticide spills are available from CHEMTREC in the USA (**Customer # 23488**) or from CANUTEC in Canada.

Training program

This contingency plan is a component of training sessions for personnel who apply or transport the lampricides. Familiarization with the various scenarios described in this plan and the implementation of prompt, responsive action in each situation is stressed. The plan is reviewed and updated as necessary. Copies of the contingency plan, spill clean-up equipment, and protective gear are included in transport vehicles and at lampricide application sites.

Packaging

TFM is a liquid formulation packaged in heavy-duty, approximately 5-gal plastic containers that weigh about 50 pounds. This container size limits potential spills by eliminating bulk storage containers.

TFM bars are packaged individually in resealable plastic containers. The containers are shipped in cardboard boxes.

Bayluscide 3.2% Granular Sea Lamprey Larvicide is packaged in 5-gal plastic buckets. Each bucket with product weighs about 50 lbs. The type of packaging, moderate container size, stacking restrictions, and use of pallets minimize the likelihood of a significant spill during storage, transport, or handling.

Bayluscide 20% Emulsifiable Concentrate is packaged in 1- or 5-L plastic bottles. Bottles are shipped and stored in cardboard boxes.

Storage

Lampricide stockpiles are secured under lock. Local fire departments are alerted of the presence of lampricides and of special firefighting procedures recommended for these chemicals (see SDS; appendix F). Building construction and placarding follow state guidelines. A spill and emergency response plan is in place for the lampricide storage facilities in Ludington and Marquette and are available in the station safety plans.

Transport

Enclosed trucks and lockable trailers are used to transport lampricides to application points. In the U.S. the transport of formulations of Bayluscide and TFM is regulated by the Department of Transportation; transportation of amounts of pesticides over regulated quantities requires additional certification and training to acquire the required CDL license. Each driver carries a copy of this contingency plan and has access to safety equipment and spill containment and clean-up kits. In Canada, transport of lampricides follows Transport of Dangerous Goods guidelines (Transport of Dangerous Goods Regulations, 1992). If lampricide is lost during transport the following steps are followed:

1. Assess the situation
2. Document the route traveled
3. Contact supervisors and authorities
 - a. Treatment Supervisor
 - b. Station Supervisor (LBS), Unit Supervisor (MBS), or Control Section Head (DFO)
 - c. Field Supervisor
 - d. Local Authorities
 - e. State or provincial authorities
 - f. National Pollution Emergency Alerting System (PEAS) or Ministry of Environment, Conservation and Parks (MECP) – for potential spill
4. Notify previous list if lampricide is recovered
5. If lampricide was spilled when lost, follow procedures in “Spills on land” or “Spills into water”.

Application

Lampricide treatments on streams are conducted by certified pesticide applicators. Lampricide application and monitoring procedures ensure that the concentration of lampricide remains within a restrictive yet effective range. Lampricide containers are opened only as needed at streamside application points. Precautions are taken to ensure that only required quantities of TFM are transported to, and stored at individual application points.

Empty TFM containers are triple-rinsed or equivalent at treatment sites, rendered useless by crushing or puncturing, and disposed of in an approved municipal landfill or offered for recycling. Empty Bayluscide containers are disposed of following label directions. Lampricide dispensing equipment is thoroughly rinsed at treatment or survey sites.

Spills on land

In the event of a major lampricide spill (≥ 1 container) during storage or transport or at an application site it is a priority that the spill is stopped at its source, the spilled material is contained, and the proper authorities are notified. Shovels and other hand tools are used for immediate containment or channelization of spilled lampricide into a containment area. Spills of granular Bayluscide on land are readily controlled by sweeping and shoveling by personnel protected from dust inhalation. The following actions are taken as necessary to contain and clean up a major spill on the ground:

1. Put on all necessary PPE, secure the scene, and stop the spill at the source.
2. Immediately contact the Treatment Supervisor and provide the quantity and details of the lampricide spill. Communication of the event will proceed as follows:
3. If the spill is on a roadway, Treatment Supervisor calls National PEAS to initiate National Response Center which communicates spill to proper authorities and health department. Call 911 to initiate police assistance to block traffic and provide protection during clean-up efforts. Contact CHEMTREC/CANUTEC for environmental clean-up assistance.
 - a. Treatment Supervisor contacts Station Supervisor, Unit Supervisor, or Control Section Head.
 - b. Station Supervisor, Unit Supervisor, or Control Section Head will contact the environmental or National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) regulatory agency in that State or Province and provide details of the spill on land and clean-up efforts.
 - c. Station, Unit Supervisor, or Control Section Head will contact the Field Supervisor who will then contact the GLFC and Regional Office.
4. Dike liquid formulations of TFM and Bayluscide in pools using absorbent mats and socks.
5. Absorb liquid formulations of TFM and Bayluscide with clay, soil, or noncombustible absorbent materials. Shovel or sweep dried TFM or Bayluscide and contaminated absorbent materials into piles. All contaminated materials must be removed from the site and packaged for hazardous waste disposal, which requires specific hazardous material packaging. Licensed haulers transport waste containers to a hazardous waste treatment, storage, or disposal facility. Contact CHEMTREC for nearest disposal facility. If TFM/Bayluscide residue remains, scrub the area with water and/or soap solution. Utilize dikes and absorbent materials to contain/collect rinsate and dispose of properly. Large or widely spread residues on contaminated pavement may require assistance.

Spills into water

During highway transport there is the possibility of a vehicle accident over or near a waterway. In such an occurrence containment action is initiated to prevent or minimize movement into a waterway. If a major lampricide spill occurs into a stream not scheduled for immediate lampricide treatment, the following emergency actions are initiated:

1. Put on all necessary PPE, secure the scene, and stop the spill at the source.
2. Immediately contact the Treatment Supervisor and provide the quantity and details of the lampricide spill. Communication of the event will proceed as follows:
 - a. Treatment Supervisor calls National PEAS to initiate National Response Center which communicates spill to proper authorities and health department. Call 911 to initiate police assistance to provide protection during clean-up efforts. Contact CHEMTREC/CANUTEC for environmental clean-up assistance.

- b. Treatment Supervisor contacts Station Supervisor, Unit Supervisor, or Control Section Head.
 - c. Station Supervisor, Unit Supervisor, or Control Section Head will contact the environmental or National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) regulatory agency in that State or Province and provide details of the spill on land and clean-up efforts.
 - d. Station Supervisor, Unit Supervisor, or Control Section Head will contact the Field Supervisor who will then contact the GLFC and Regional Office.
3. It may be determined that an emergency advisory on water use restrictions surrounding the spill location is initiated through local radio and door-to-door contacts. The emergency advisory prohibits water use for drinking, cooking, other household uses, swimming and fishing until further notification.

Initiate lampricide monitoring to follow and determine the concentration of lampricide and non-target effects. Monitoring will continue until lampricide concentrations are below minimum lethal concentration for the water body and until non-target effects are not observed. Automatic water samplers are set at the intake(s) of any municipal water supply system that might be impacted as the result of the spill.

Reporting of Spills

In the United States, spills of pesticides are reported to individual states, as detailed at the end of this Appendix. For example, in Michigan, an accidental spill of 1 or more containers must be reported to the PEAS and the Michigan Environment, Great Lakes, and Energy (EGLE). Emergency contacts for other State/Provincial environmental regulatory agencies are listed below. The State Police are called to provide assistance at the scene. States require that spills of the following magnitude be reported: TFM, one container (approximately 5 gals); Bayluscide 3.2% Sea Lamprey Larvicide, one container (50 lbs); one plastic container (0.5 lb); and Bayluscide 20% Emulsifiable Concentrate, 1 bottle (5L). If any uncontrolled release (any amount not dispensed by a pump) of TFM or Bayluscide occurs, a treatment supervisor must be immediately notified and they will follow communication guidelines.

In Canada, spills of the following magnitude must be reported immediately to local police, Ministry of Environment, Conservation, and Parks (MECP) and CANUTEC: TFM, 30 L (1 can) or greater and Bayluscide 20% Emulsifiable Concentrate, 5 L or greater. The content of the immediate report must include:

- a) Shipping name of product or UN number
- b) Quantity of dangerous goods in the shipment and quantity released
- c) Location of the accidental release
- d) Number of injuries and/or deaths
- e) Estimate of the number of people evacuated

If an immediate report is made, the employer of the person who made the immediate report must send a written follow-up report within 30 days to the Transport of Dangerous Goods General containing the following information:

- a) Name, address, and telephone number of the place of business
- b) Date, time, and location of the accidental release
- c) Name and address of consignor
- d) Classification of the dangerous goods
- e) Quantity of dangerous goods in the shipment and an estimate of the amount that was released
- f) Description of the means of containment involved and if the container failed or was damaged and how it happened
- g) In case of an accidental release from a cylinder that suffered a catastrophic failure, the certification safety mark and a description of the failure
- h) Number of deaths and injuries
- i) Estimate of the number of people evacuated
- j) Whether an Emergency Response Action Plan was activated, and the name of the person who responded

Note: Restricted use pesticide labels and SDS are contained in Appendices E and F respectively.

Clean-up

4. Shovel or sweep dried lampricide into piles. All contaminated materials must be removed from site and packaged for hazardous waste disposal.
5. Contact CHEMTREC for disposal facility or if you need assistance with clean-up.

Monitoring

1. Continue monitoring concentrations downstream
 - Set up ISCOs if needed
2. Monitor for nontargets downstream
3. Continue monitoring efforts until lampricide concentration falls below MLC and nontargets are not observed.
4. Submit adverse incident report to NPDES regulatory agency for uncontrolled spill.
